This week's Parsha opens with Avraham sitting at the entrance of his tent waiting for guests. We are all familiar with Avraham's kindness and his attitude towards הכנסת אורחים. Despite his frail condition, אברהם was sitting, waiting, and hoping that a guest would come for him to serve.

The Pesukim continue וירא אליו ד' באלוני ממרא. Our Chachamim teach us that the reason for the presence of Hashem on this occasion was to be מבקר חולה to Avraham.

of the Pasuk 'רבינו אשר, explains that the wording of the Pasuk 'וירא אליו ד', followed by silence as to what Hashem said, indicates to us that Hashem said nothing at all, he just visited. The Talmud uses this as the source for the ביקור 6 מצוה, that we should emulate Hashem in His kindness. As we continue to read the Pesukim, we discover that there is so much more here than meets the eye.

The Pesukim go on to tell the story of that day: Avraham raised his eyes and behold, before him were three guests. Avraham hurries to welcome them into his home and prepare a meal for them. The Torah then shares the true identity of these visitors: they were מלאכים, each one on its own important mission. One שלאך was to inform שברהם and שבה that they would have a child, a second was on a mission to destroy סדום, and the third came to heal אברהם from his Bris Milah.

After reading this entire narrative, one can't help but wonder: if Hashem was coming to visit Avraham himself, then why did he have to send a מלאך to heal him? Surely Hashem was capable of "multi-tasking" to visit and heal at the same time!

The answer is beautiful in its simplicity. If Hashem had both visited and healed Avraham, then the love and care expressed in His visit would have been overshadowed in some way by the healing function of His visit. Hashem therefore designated a מלאך to perform the healing, so that Hashem's full presence would be felt by Avraham.

To take this a step further, it is interesting to note the task that Hashem sent מלאכים to accomplish and the one that He did personally. Hashem chose the delicate task of providing emo-

I think that we sometimes fail to recognize the importance of emotional care in our own lives and the lives of our loved ones. We are constantly busy "multi-tasking," taking care of the physical needs of those around us. But how often do we contemplate the emotional needs of others? Do we focus our mind on the words of others to absorb their words and the emotions behind them? Physical needs are important and we must of course attend to them, but we must make sure not to neglect emotional ones

The message we can glean from the multiple windows in Avraham's tent and Hashem's visit, apply to our own homes and windows. We have "windows" on our computers, phones and tablets. As we gaze at those windows we generally multi-task. We shop online while we talk to our friends, we talk to our friends while we care for our children, we care for our children while we make dinner, we eat our dinner while we gaze at those windows, and so the circle continues

We live in a society that glorifies this type of life, which they call being productive. The message of the Parsha though, is that when we want to do something well, we need to close all of the windows of distraction. When we attend to someone, we need to attend to them emotionally as well. We need to close the windows that divert us from ourselves and open the window into our soul and into our life.
